At the last meeting the Assembly had some questions related to the possible buy out program. Here are the answers as requested:

State DHS & EM has expressed interest in the project and may be able to assist in offsetting the match, however no commitment has been made as of today.

Additionally, the State Floodplain Management Office is evaluating the eligibility of individual property owners to receive direct funding to assist in relocation; these funds would likely count as part of the match. Again, no commitment has been made as of today.

Finally, the option of legislative funding assistance remains if the Assembly chooses to request it. The Assembly would need to commit the entire 25% match before the September 22 deadline, and can continue to seek funds to offset the match. Legal is in the process of delineating what the borough envisions as in-kind match services for inclusion in the final agreement.

The project is funding dependent. When funds are expended, the project is complete. There is no requirement to procure all the prioritized parcels.

WHO APPLIED FOR THE GRANT?

The funds were applied for by the USDA Erosion Control office in Kenai under the EWP as a congressional appropriation to the USDA EWP program budget for a pilot program in the Seward area. Once an agreement is in place, the funds are provided to the KPB as a reimbursement grant. Funds were not available to the KPB until the USDA

appropriation was approved by congress and the USDA project successfully climbed a national waiting list.

Following the 2006 flood damage, and during the 2007 spring floods, Homeland Security and a contingent of agencies including DEC, USDA, DOT, DNR, habitat folks, flood board members and other KPB offices including OEM responded to the subdivision to evaluate it during a flood incident and to come up with possible long term mitigation options.

USDA discussed the need for a project in the area, and determined that the Old Mill area would be a good start. The consensus of the multi agency group and hydrologists was that removal of habitable structures was the most cost effective and reasonable solution.

USDA researched the probability of funding and approached the KPB in August 2007 to get a letter requesting such funding be directed to the area in support of the USDA congressional request process.

WHEN WAS IT AUTHORIZED?

KPB was informed on August 4th, 2008 that congress had funded a number of projects nationwide and that the Old Mill program was on the national waiting list. USDA met with KPB on August 12 to answer questions and discuss the basic program, and to describe a similar program in Fairbanks. Funding was very likely.

Later that week, USDA provided basic background information, and indicated congress had approved about \$1.3million, requiring a 25% local match. USDA indicated a shortened commitment date of September 22, 2008 was required.


Literally on the afternoon of the August 19 Assembly meeting (lay-down night), USDA provided an agreement draft and reiterated the September 22 drop dead date.

WHAT IS THE ASSESSED VALUE?

The ten parcels on the USDA priority list for this project have an assessed value of \$1,687,600.
