Marcus Mueller, and others,

I thought you might like to see these pictures taken a few months ago. As you will see the new road, rerouted around the Kaloa property, was not surveyed properly and culverts not placed according to run off. It has acted as a dam for water coming off the wetlands area, and then made its own path to Ladd Landing, causing a major wash out of the road and surrounding area. Since these pictures, another culvert has been put in, we will see if there is the same problem in the spring when we have a "REAL" run off of water from the wetlands.

This is just a little problem compared to what will happen if a conveyor road/support road for the mine goes in. It to will act as a dam (a huge damn) as it has too drain some where, either towards the Inlet or the Chuitna River. This is just ONE of the foreseeable problems for us on this side of the Inlet.

As Mayor Carey/Assembly, and others working for the Kenai Peninsula Borough, have not seen fit to come, see first hand, or listen to the property owners/land users it is very frustrating to say the least. 



Ladd Lease Letter

This is a letter you may still have that explains the problems of commercial fishing with proposed energy facility.





Mayor Carey, Members of the Kenai Borough Assembly, and Land Management Office.

Re: The Ladd Landing Lease you are about to consider will have a tremendous land use impact on the Kenai Peninsula Borough property owners, commercial fisherman, and recreational users of Tyonek and 'Beluga.

My name is Terry Jorgensen and I have been commercially fishing Three Mile Beach directly tied into the Ladd Landing since 1981. This beach has been continuously been fished by fish traps and/or set nets since the 1890's. The citizens of the state of Alaska own this beach and submerged lands which I lease with ADL 24318, Tract D Shore Fisheries Lease. The citizens of the Kenai Peninsula Borough own the uplands directly north of my lease and have elected many of you as caretakers in leasing these public lands to various coal concerns for thirty years. Three Mile Beach in the Ladd Landing area is relatively steep for the first 250 feet offshore and has been used as a barge landing by Chugach Electric and numerous oil companies since the Beluga Gas fields were discovered in the 1960's. Landing operators and commercial interests have worked well in recognizing commercial fishing property rights. Because a large storm washed out Ladd Landing, Grant Landing was created less than ½ mile northward to continue the Beluga barge landings and gas drilling operations in the past few years.

It is very important to understand that Pac Rim is planning a major energy port facility with three major components that will completely change the land use of the Beluga/Tyonek area and my livelihood. The first is a 250 million ton uncovered coal storage facility adjacent to the waters of Cook Inlet on Kenai Peninsula Borough land. The second is a 800x300 feet manmade island structure in the waters of Cook Inlet with supporting pilings and bridge to the Ladd Landing area. This island is to be located 320-570 feet offshore directly in front of 4 valid shore fishery leases and long term fishing operations. The third is a 10,000 feet piling-supported trestle facility driven into Cook Inlet and attached to Ladd Landing. Although Skip Joy, with the Corps of Engineers and Robin Swineford, with DNR's offshore leasing department will oversee the consistency review of the permit request for Cook Inlet waters, both recognize the importance of the KPB Ladd Landing Lease you are about to consider. Although Federal and State officials will be in charge of the consistency review of the mining corridor and mine site itself, all coal and its potential physical and legal impacts will arrive on KPB land at Ladd. The Kenai Peninsula government then is in a unique position to incorporate language in the lease that protects Borough citizens and is consistent with Federal and State law.

With this thought in mind, I came before the KPB Assembly and Mayor Williams and discussed this matter on the record in Feb of 2007. During this meeting I handed out written materials and maps to all members so they could visualize how this would impact citizens of the Borough on the other side of the Inlet. I requested a public hearing at Beluga or Tyonek to address the concerns of residents. This meeting has still not taken place. I appreciate the response and concerns stated by our Assemblyman Gary Superman and Mr. Marcus Mueller in the Land Management Office. We all agree this decision cannot be made without good information. I have attached a letter that explains

the nature, seasons, and impacts that this development would have on commercial fishing. Listed below are stipulations that I feel the Ladd Landing lease should incorporate to protect the residents and commercial fisherman of Beluga and Tyonek.

Ladd Landing Lease should support the Coastal Management Plan principle as outlined in 6AAC80.070#16 Select sites where it will not interfere with fishing operations. Stipulations to support this on Three Mile Beach should include:

- 1. No year around docking island structure can be attached to Ladd Landing
- No commercial barge traffic can interfere with regular scheduled commercial fishing periods. By regulation the Northern District King Salmon fishery opens on Memorial Day in the last week in May and continues for four consecutive Mondays from 7AM to 7PM.
 By regulation the general salmon season opens the first Monday or Thursday after June 25 and continues until the end of the year.
 Typical peaks of Sockeye are July 14-August 5; Coho: July 22-August 15; Chum: July 24-August 10; and Pink: August 1- August 10th.
- 3. No commercial structure, pipeline, cable system, waste materials, or equipment may impede commercial fishing on three Mile Beach
- 4. Any offshore trestle attached to Ladd Landing must be enclosed to protect the waters and fish resources of Cook Inlet.
- 5. All coal Storage shall be located at least 400 feet from Cook Inlet and 400 feet from existing private and commercial fishing water wells.
- 6. All coal storage piles will be covered, watered, or treated to prevent air pollution into Cook Inlet and adjacent private property and be in compliance with DEC coal pollution regulations enforced after major coal dust problems in Seward, Alaska.
- 7. Any offshore fuel transfer facility attached to Ladd Landing must be located onehalf mile offshore of MLW.
- 8. All fuel storage tanks will be located at least 200 feet from Cook Inlet.
- 9. All runoff water from coal storage areas at Ladd Landing must be drained westward and not placed directly into Cook Inlet.
- 10. Traditional right of way to Three Mile Beach by commercial fishermen and citizens will be granted at Ladd Landing.

I feel it is reasonable to issue a short term lease without these provisions until a complete application has been submitted to the Corps of Engineers, and the State of Alaska. Pac Rim has no offshore lease at Ladd, and they have not submitted a revised Ladd Landing

application outlining major concerns of local residents or fisherman. In fact it may be, according to regulators, up to three years before all the permit requirements have been met. If a major energy port is created on KPB property at Ladd it is critical to review Federal, State, KPB laws and regulations in place to guide reclassification before any long term lease is issued. This Ladd Landing Lease is at the center of future utilization, development, and conservation of KPB lands on the North side of Cook Inlet and will greatly affect its people. All government originates with the people of Alaska. Public hearings are therefore critical to determine the impacts on Beluga and Tyonek. It is reasonable to hold these hearings both in Kenai in the winter and Beluga/Tyonek in the summer. It is consistent with the public interest to carefully review the impact of this energy port as:

outlined in the Kenai Peninsula Borough Code, all lands or interests in lands or resources owned by the borough must be classified or reclassified in a manner consistent with the purposes and policies of KPB lands ordinances. KPB 17.10.080(B). The purpose of classification is to designate the most appropriate uses for land and "thereby guide borough management of such lands and implementation actions to provide for the identified uses." KPB 17.10.080(A).

The policies that guide borough management of land and resources (and with which classification decisions must be consistent) are as follows:

- Efficient acquisition, management, classification and disposal of borough lands;
- Promotion of orderly development;
- o Protection and orderly management of borough's natural resources;
- Preservation of borough lands and resources for wildlife habitat, scenic value, recreational needs, and historic needs;
- Retention of borough lands essential for health, safety and education needs;
- Orderly disposal of lands and resources in a manner that is "fair to all."

outlined in KPB 17.10.080(E) Lands are classified or reclassified based on needs identified in the borough Comprehensive Plan, or based on a recommendation from virtually any interested party, including a member of the public.

outlined in Alaska Statute 44.62 (f), 46.40.210 1(c d f) AAC Title 6 80.070, 89.130 under the Kenai Peninsula Borough Coastal Management Plan.

outlined in the Alaskan Constitution Article 8 sections 1,2,6,8,13,and 16. Article 1 sections 1,2,15,18 and 23.

outlined in Federal compliance standards for the placement of structures and the discharge or fill material into coastal water. 320-323,33 CFR Vol. 42 of the Federal Register pp. 37133-47

outlined in United States Code Title 16 Conservation Chapter 35-Endangered Species Sec 1537A, 1535, 1536, and 1533.

This is not a time to rush to judgment concerning the Ladd Landing Lease. This is a time to carefully inform your self about the issues related to creating a major energy port at Ladd. The KPB holds the critical link from mine to tidewater with this lease. Now is the time to gather information and listen to the concerns of commercial fisherman like myself and local residents that will be greatly impacted. Every state and federal regulator has appreciated walking tours of Ladd by local residents. If your position allows you control over this area will you be willing to walk the beach with local citizens? In all the meetings I have attended at Beluga, Anchorage and Tyonek I have never heard one single person who favors this development as it is planned. It is essential that public hearings and informational meetings be held as the lease options and stipulations are being considered, not after the fact once the lease has been written.

If you have any specific questions about how we fish Three Mile see the attached letter. If you have any questions concerning any proposed stipulation I will be glad to explain at your convenience. I will be glad to participate in any committee or aid in setting up a formal hearing in Tyonek or Beluga next summer.

I am writing this letter to clearly state my opposition to any extension of the Ladd Landing Lease for Pac Rim's Chuitna Coal Project. I have written many of these letters over the past couple of the years. The faces on the board change but the issue of allowing Pac Rim the right to off load it's coal at Ladd Landing goes on and on.

On the face of it I could site the Borough's conflict with the spirit of its own leasing policy which states:

1. The protection and orderly management of borough's natural resources.

2. The preservation of borough lands and resources for wildlife habitat, scenic value, recreational needs and historic needs.

3. The orderly disposal of lands and resources in a manner which is "fair to all."

The Grant family has lived and commercially fished since 1950 on 3-mile Beach and the Beluga area. We have complied with all laws and regulations concerning our fishing activities and land use prescribed by first the Territory of Alaska and then the State. We have dutifully paid our taxes to the borough. In return we expect fair representation. So please do your job and represent us and not an outside coal operation that is here for only one reason, to exploit the natural resources at the expense of your constituents.

I have a more specific reason to ask for you not to provide an extension on the Ladd Landing Lease. Plain and simple if Pac Rim is allowed to use Ladd Landing for off loading coal than their plans to build a trestle and artificial island right on top of my families fishing sites may come to fruition. Attached is a copy of the plan update for building of that artificial island. Although Pac Rim has proposed to move the island from right on top of our fishing sites to the south, the same result will take place. 3-mile Beach is a shallow tidal area with currents running up to 8 knots. Large amounts of sand and silt move along the beach. In addition,


salmon as they move up the inlet toward their spawning rivers move along the beach area. Now put up a wall 600 ft wide and 800 ft long. There will naturally be a build up of sand and silt around this artificial island and the normal movement of salmon will be altered. In fact the salmon will be pushed out off the beach. What do you think the fishing sites behind this obstacle will harvest? Yet we paid in good faith to the State for limited entry permits for a reasonable opportunity to catch salmon.

Now I understand that the Borough does not control activities in the tidal areas. That is the State's responsibility. Yet the Borough does control the land leading to these tidal areas. The fact a large energy port at Ladd Landing will have a devastating effect on the habitat and on our commercial fishing activities is not just theory but fact.

My father, Frank Grant, settled in Alaska in 1939. He just passed away in December at the age of 97. He spent most of his life in Alaska in and around the 3-mile Beach and Beluga area. He loved it for its beauty. He respected the fact he was able to make a living and raise a family by not taking advantage of nature but by living with it. He understood progress and grudgingly accepted the changes that came. But he could not understand how something as devastating as an open pit coal mine with its destruction of the natural order of things for man or animal could be allowed simply because there was money to be made. He asked me just before he died to appeal to the decision makers for them to do the right thing and not destroy what he loved for selfish short term goals. I am appealing to you now to do the right thing and stop Pac Rim's efforts to lease Ladd Landing.

Our family, along with many other people, bought more land at Beluga Township with the promise from the Kenai Borough that the area was being developed as a subdivision, with homesites and recreational areas. I know many people who frequently visit the area for recreation, but who do not own property now. They have no intention of buying land at a strip mine and industrial port.

The coal mine will make an industrial cesspool out of the area destroying fish and game habitat. We have voiced our outrage before but it seems Kenai Borough is hell-bent-for-election to put that coal mine through. If the Seward coal facility can not keep the coal dust under control, what makes you think it will be any better at Ladd Landing? We get 90 mile an hour winds out there.
