KENAI PENINSULA BOROUGH RESOLUTION 2003-094

A RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF CS FOR HB 240 AND SB 186, ACTS RELATING TO CHARITABLE GAMING THROUGH IMPLEMENTATION OF ELECTRONIC GAMING MACHINES (EGM) IN THE STATE OF ALASKA

- WHEREAS, municipalities have and will continue to suffer various revenue sharing cuts from both the state and federal governments; and
- WHEREAS, these decreases inevitably equate to a greater tax burden for local taxpayers, especially property taxes; and
- WHEREAS, property taxes are the most damaging for economic growth; and
- WHEREAS, the Kenai Peninsula Borough does support a balanced long range revenue and spending plan as a priority; legislative implementation of this plan must also consider all mechanisms that could mitigate the effects of deteriorating historic revenue streams to municipalities; and
- WHEREAS, electronic gaming legislation would provide a new revenue stream to the state, licensees and charities of \$50 \$80 Million each, municipalities would receive a 10 percent share of the annual statewide revenue (\$18-\$25 Million); and
- WHEREAS, the Kenai Peninsula Borough would realize \$2,000,000 \$3,000,000 from this new revenue stream; and
- WHEREAS, every state in the union except Hawaii and Utah has some form of legalized gaming; and
- WHEREAS, charitable gaming's use of pull tabs was legalized by statute in 1988; and
- WHEREAS, in 2001, the combined gross receipts for charitable gaming were \$351,000,000; and
- WHEREAS, charitable, civic, service, educational, fraternal and native organizations; municipalities; veterans; trade associations; police and fire departments and religious groups utilize existing gaming regulations to help fund operations and social programs which are a viable needed component of Alaska's economy; and

- WHEREAS, these organizations' abilities to self sustain relieves funding pressure on the municipalities; and
- WHEREAS, many nonprofits and municipalities are struggling and revenues are down; and
- WHEREAS, Governor Murkowski, in his transmittal letter requesting action on HB 169, (An Act Increasing the Amount of Revenue received by the State from Charitable Gaming Activities) recognizes gaming as a potential new revenue stream;
- WHEREAS, passage of this act alone would negatively affect charitable activities and does not address a new revenue sharing mechanism to municipalities; and
- WHEREAS, today's gaming technology will provide enhanced accountability and security with little reporting requirements, virtually assuring correct dispensation to the state, municipalities, permittees and vendors;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE ASSEMBLY OF THE KENAI PENINSULA BOROUGH:

- **SECTION 1.** That the Kenai Peninsula Borough Assembly supports the legalization of Electronic Gaming Machines as conceptually found in CS for HB 240 and SB 186.
- SECTION 2. Copies of this resolution shall be distributed to Senators Con Bunde, Georgiana Lincoln, Gary Stevens and Tom Wagoner; Representatives Mike Chenault, Mike Hawker, Carl Morgan, Paul Seaton and Kelly Wolf; Speaker of the House Pete Kott; Senate President Gene Therriault; House Finance Chairs John Harris and Bill Williams; Senate Finance Chairs Lyda Green and Gary Wilken; and House Labor and Commerce Chair Tom Anderson.

SECTION 3. That this resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.
